In case you missed it, here are some of the real-life stories that inspired the campaign.

Luci Forbes

Luci's world changed last year when a routine scan showed she had a bleed behind her eye. The chance examination was the start of months of intensive treatment to try to save as much of her sight as possible.

Luci's condition was caused by a complication of diabetes and has left her with no peripheral vision and trouble seeing distances and shapes, as well as difficulties with depth perception.



Before I got involved with **iSight**Cornwall, I was just kind of struggling on. I thought that because I still had some vision, my condition wasn't severe enough to warrant the charity's support. But they've helped me in so many ways. I've been able to talk to other people who are going through similar things to me and I know that if I need anything, **iSight**Cornwall are just a phone call away. Without them I would have been lost.


Jean was just four years old when her vision began to deteriorate and she lost the sight in one eye. Now aged 89, Jean suffers from a range of conditions, including cataracts and myopic macular degeneration (MMD).

My sight has got so much worse as I've got older and it's changed my whole life. I'm alright in familiar places but I'm hopeless in a strange environment. After the lockdown ended I realised I was spending more and more time stuck at home. I've got a lovely family, but I don't want to rely on them all the time, so when I heard about the Walking Buddy scheme I thought it sounded like a great idea. It's been absolutely wonderful, Judy makes me feel young again! I've not just got a walking buddy, I've got a real friend.

Haydn Uren

Haydn lost his eyesight after a fall when he was five years old and has been in and out of hospital for most of his life. Despite everything he's been through, Haydn has been determined to lead a normal life. He's been able to progress through primary and then secondary school before going onto Truro College whilst using software packages, computer equipment and other technology which has been specially designed for people with sight loss.

"I often go to **iSight**Cornwall and talk to them about the latest gadgets around and they show me what they can do. If there's anything I've needed or asked about, I've been able to go to them and they'll help me. **iSight**Cornwall has been absolutely brilliant to me."

Events roadshow

We were delighted to get our events roadshow back up and running this summer with events in Penzance. Truro and Redruth. Approximately 180 people joined us over the three days to find out what support is available. Visitors were able to try a range of different handheld and stand magnifiers, get advice on how best to use them and find out more about how to get a low vision appointment. They could also get a look at the latest offerings from the world of technology, get advice on how to make their current mobile devices more accessible and learn more about using speech-based software.

The events in Truro and Redruth were organised by Optelec who produce a range of electronic magnifiers including the Ruby and the Compact HD. For these events, Optelec and the **iSight**Cornwall team were also joined by a number of other organisations including Dolphin, the Macular Society, Cornish Talking Newspapers, Age UK, Blind Veterans and the RNIB.



Due to the success of these events we are planning to visit a number of other towns across Cornwall in the coming months starting with St Austell, Launceston and Wadebridge. Members will be sent details of the events in their area in advance.

Trustee success

iSightCornwall trustee, Steve Holyer, has been given a prestigious award for his innovative product design and development.

Steve has been a member of iSightCornwall for more than 30 years and on the board of trustees for five years but when he is not busy helping to shape the future of the charity, he spends his time inventing and creating new products to help blind or partially sighted people like himself.

As the founding director of easyAccessibility, formerly known as ADi Access, Steve's biggest success story is The RoomMate which has helped make public toilets accessible to thousands.

The RoomMate is an electronic, wall-mounted device that offers an audio description of the facilities to users, and it was this that caught the attention of Institution of Engineering Designers (IED).

The IED is the UK's only professional body representing those working in the fields of Engineering and Technological Product Design.

This year the IED's Council named Steve as the winner of the Alex Moulton Award which Institution of Engineering Legineers



is given to 'an individual or a company in recognition of development of an innovative product'. Previous winners of this award include the Dyson design team.

The council were impressed by The RoomMate as well as Steve's more recent creation, the Huju All Terrain Cane Tip which can be added to Ambutech long and guide canes. It is the only cane tip that can be used on all surfaces including grass, sand and gravel. Steve was invited to accept the award at a prestigious ceremony at the Falkirk Wheel in Scotland.

"It was a complete surprise; I got a letter out of the blue saying I had been nominated and then another saying I had won. It's particularly meaningful because all of the members of the institute vote for the nominations so it was brilliant to be chosen."

Leach pottery

Earlier this year, several of our members took part in workshops at Leach Pottery in St Ives. Following on from the success of that, Leach Pottery have offered us more workshops in the new year. Pendennis Castle historical tour

Members of **iSight**Cornwall have been offered a fantastic opportunity to take part in a tour of Pendennis Castle which will include tactile elements and audio descriptions that are not usually available to visitors at the English Heritage site.

The tour has been devised by a volunteer from Pendennis Castle, who also happens to be a walking buddy volunteer for **iSight**Cornwall. Not only has Jan designed the tour herself, but she has also secured funding to offer free places on the tour for each person plus an accompanying sighted guide.

There are a limited number of places available for the tour

which will take place in spring 2024, so we are currently asking for expressions of interest with places being allocated on a first-come, firstserved basis.

It is worth noting that the history of the castle goes back to the 1540s so there are a lot of steps and awkward changes of level throughout the building. The tour has been designed to avoid the narrow spiral staircase in the Keep but there will be some walking to do between various locations.

Audio book

We were very excited when local author, Christopher Johnson, dropped into the Sight Centre with some of his books and offered to turn them into audio versions for our members. Over the course of several months, Christopher has been recording his stories and with the help of a friend, he has created a collection of 12 short stories which are available on request from the Sight Centre.

Ticket office closures

With the threat of railway ticket offices being closed for good, **iSight**Cornwall, along with many other disability groups and unions, raised concerns that this would create huge barriers for disabled travellers.

Ticket offices and frontline railway staff play an essential role in making train travel possible for so many people, especially people with sight loss.

iSightCornwall's Dominic Hall appeared on local news programmes to share his experiences and concerns and we shared the public consultation details on our website and social media.



Thankfully, with the consultation receiving 750,000 responses, the message from the public became clear and on 31 October it was revealed that the Government had asked train operators to withdraw the proposals.

A big thank you to everyone who took part in the consultation, and everyone who encouraged their friends and family to write a response.

A Wine Tasting Like No Other

Old Chapel Cellars, a local independent wine merchant, have chosen **iSight**Cornwall as their charity of the year and held a special event in August to mark the start of their fundraising activities.

A Wine Tasting Like No Other was a sold-out wine tasting event that took place at the Old Chapel Cellars' premises in Truro. More than 30 people were guided through the process of tasting different wines but with the added twist of doing it whilst blindfolded. The idea behind the event was to find out how our perceptions are altered when we can't use our sight to give us clues. For example, could the guests tell the difference between red and white wine when both were chilled?

Old Chapel Cellars co-owners, Jamie and Louisa selected **iSight**Cornwall as their charity of the year after reading about the charity's work helping people with sight loss in the county. It inspired the pair to think about what it would be like to lose their sight.

Louisa explained: "In our business we rely on our senses to tell us about the different wines, but what would happen if one of those senses were taken away? This was something that really resonated with us and is why we chose **iSight**Cornwall to be our charity of the year."

Louisa, Jamie and the team are hosting a number of winetasting events in the run up to Christmas and all of the profits will be donated to **iSight**Cornwall.

Members and supporters of Cape Cornwall Golf Club raised a fantastic £1,810 for **iSight**Cornwall. The charity was chosen by ladies captain, Frieda Pring for her 2022/23 captaincy and benefited from fundraising events organised by Frieda throughout the year.

Crowds of people waited at the finish line, keeping warm with teas and coffees and raising money through a raffle supported by local businesses.



Cornish Marathon

Two friends have raised a fantastic £1,910 for **iSight**Cornwall thanks to their 'marathon' effort.

In 2022, Nicola Vosper was left severely sight impaired following major surgery to remove a tumour. She has spent the last year adapting to the change and, with the support of family, friends and iSightCornwall, she has slowly regained her confidence to start running again, something which she used to enjoy so much. With her husband Fran and friend Jane Stedman. Nic started off running short distances whilst getting used to being guided.

In just 12 months, Nic had built up enough confidence to take on the Cornish Marathon with Jane as her guide. It was Nic's sixth marathon but her first since losing her sight. However, she was in good hands - Jane is a veteran runner with well over 300 marathons under her belt. Using a figure of eight dog rope to connect them, the pair built up an understanding and trust with each other.

They set themselves a fundraising target of £1,000 which they almost doubled thanks to the generosity of friends, family, local community groups and members of Bugle Blues Bowling Club which Nic attends.

Proudly wearing their **iSight**Cornwall t-shirts, Nic and Jane finished the Cornish Marathon with a time of five hours, twelve minutes and 45 seconds, smashing Nic's target of five and a half hours. Fran ran 17 miles alongside them as an additional guide runner and friends and family lined the route to cheer them on.

Nic said: "I am so lucky to be surrounded by brilliant people who have encouraged and supported me every step of the way. Getting out and going for a run just picks me up, I feel miserable if I'm stuck indoors for too long and it's been fantastic to be able to get out there and do something I enjoy."

Maurice has been volunteering at Saltash BAPS for over ten years. Energy Suppliers

Priority services register

With wintery weather ahead, now is a good time to sign up to the Priority Services Register. It was created to ensure those in need are able to get information about interruptions to services more quickly and have their services restored as soon as possible. You will be eligible if you have sight loss, are over the state pension age or have a long-term health condition.

Electric

The National Grid's Priority Services Register (PSR) provides extra help and additional support during a power cut for elderly, very ill or disabled people, or those who rely on power for medical equipment.

Remember, you can always call 105 for free during a power cut for help and advice.

Gas

Each gas supplier holds its own priority register. Contact your supplier directly and ask to be added.

Some providers will be able to offer you information and bills in a more accessible format and being on the register means you may be able to get advance notice of planned works, free gas safety checks, help reading your meter as well as extra help and advice.

In an emergency you can also call the free National Gas Emergency Service on 0800 111 999.

Water

Signing up to South West Water's Priority Services Register will mean you can receive assistance in reading your meter as well as getting your bill and important information in a more accessible format such as large print, braille or audio CD.

You should receive notice of any planned works and outages and if you have a health condition which needs access to water then an alternative supply will be arranged.

Accessible smart meters

Smart meters help you to control your energy use by adopting energy efficiency measures that can help save money on your bills. They come with an In-Home Display, which shows how much energy you have used and automatically sends your meter readings to your energy supplier. But did you know that that there is an Accessible In-Home Display available for blind and partially sighted people?

The Accessible In-Home Display has all the features of a regular unit, but with additional accessibility features which include:

- Tactile buttons with audio feedback of button press
- Text-to-speech function for screen navigation
- Adjustable volume for the text-to-speech function
- Coloured LEDs which indicate electricity usage
- LED push button to replay speech
- Large typeface
- High contrast colour scheme optimised for visual impairments and colour blindness

These devices are also suitable for anyone who has difficulties with dexterity or memory loss. They are offered at no extra cost to selected customers, but they are not yet available with every supplier. In order to find out if you can get hold of an Accessible In-Home Display, please contact your energy supplier directly.

Winter eye care advice

Our eyes can go through a lot in the colder months so we've put together a guide on how to keep your eyes healthy through the winter.

UV Rays

Most of us are aware that we need to wear sunglasses to protect our eyes in the summer but did you know that the official advice is that we should be wearing sunglasses whenever the UV Index rises above three? This can happen even on a cloudy day and throughout the winter months.

The UV Index measures the strength of the sun. It doesn't have to be hot and cloudless for UV levels to be high. UV levels are graded from low (1-2) to extremely high (11+), and it is important to take action when UV levels are medium which is three or above.

UV radiation can have both short and long-term effects on the condition of our eyes. It can damage the eye's surface tissues as well as the cornea and lens. UV rays can burn the surface of the eye much like sunburn on skin. In fact, according to the Eyecare Trust, our eyes are 10 times more sensitive to UV radiation than our skin.

Long term exposure to UV radiation is a significant risk factor for cataract development, which is the leading cause of blindness in the world.

To protect your eyes from UV exposure it is important to wear good quality protective sunglasses that block out 99 to 100 percent of both UV-A and UV-B radiation. You also want glasses that screen 75 to 90 percent of visible light. Wraparound sunglasses offer the best protection and those with grey lenses still allow proper colour recognition. In order to get UV forecasts for the UK, you can visit the Met Office website www.metoffice. gov.uk or download the free Met Office app.

Wind and central hearing

Cold winter winds and central heating can play havoc with your eyes leaving them feeling dry, gritty, and sore – especially at the end of the day when symptoms are often at their worst. Cranking up your central heating can also trigger conjunctival hyperaemia (blood shot eyes).

You can avoid dry eyes in winter by reducing the setting on your central heating, but only if it feels comfortable to do so. You can also wear glasses outdoors to protect your eyes from the wind, avoid car heaters, particularly at face level and avoid direct heat such as gas or electric fires.

It's important to speak to your optometrist if you feel like your eyes are dry. They can offer lubricating eye drops or other advice.

Respiratory Infections

Respiratory infections such as common colds and flu can inflame your conjunctiva (the clear membrane that covers the whites of your eyes) leaving your eyes feeling sore and irritated. You can reduce the risk of this by washing your hands thoroughly before touching your eyes.

Eye Tests

Winter is a good time to get your sight tested as poor light conditions can mean your eyes have to work harder, making them more susceptible to fatigue and eye strain.



Assistive Technology

iSightCornwall's assistive technology adviser, Dominic Hall paid a visit to the Queen Alexandra College (QAC) Sight Village in Exeter in September to discover the latest advances in technology which can help blind and partially sighted people.

The Sight Village is an annual event which is described as the UK's leading exhibition for blind and partially sighted people. With over 60 exhibitors showcasing their products, there was plenty for Dom to explore.

Amongst the electronic magnifiers, the HumanWare Explore 12, Optelec Compact 7 and Optima Lunar Range had some really interesting new features. But what really caught Dom's attention were the advances being made on the mobility side of technology. From smart canes with GPS and audio instructions to wearable devices which can help you to navigate and avoid obstacles.

Dom has chosen his three favourite pieces of mobility tech from the event (in no particular order) to review.

Biped

Biped is a smart harness, worn on the shoulders, which gives you GPS instructions and helps you detect obstacles. It uses Artificial Intelligence (AI) and self-driving car software from the Honda Research Institute.

Dom says: "I was really intrigued by the Biped device, it's quite light and sits on your shoulders. The cameras and AI mean it can tell you about incoming obstacles, people and even traffic. It will then play short beeps via Bluetooth headphones to alert you of any danger. The company are working on bringing GPS instructions to the device which will provide turn-byturn instructions such as 'in 20 metres, turn left'."

StellarTrek

Created by HumanWare, who are behind the popular Explore range of electronic magnifiers, the StellarTrek is described as a 'digital orientation and mobility assistant'. It looks like a remote control which is about the size of your hand and uses GPS, cameras, and AI to guide you to your destination.

Dom said: "If anyone with sight loss has ever tried to use an existing sat nav application, you probably know how frustrating it is to try and follow the guidance with audio commands alone. Especially when the application gets you to within 50 yards of your destination before leaving you to find your own way.

"The StellarTrek uses voice guidance to get you to the door of your destination. It can also use the built-in cameras to read barcodes, recognise colours and scan text to read aloud. It is taking technology which is already well-proven to help people with sight loss, such as text-to-speech, and combining it with new Al features to help create new devices."

WeWALK Cane

The WeWALK Cane combines the familiar white cane with smart technology, allowing you to navigate, check bus and train timetables, and detect above-ground obstacles with ultrasound whilst still retaining the standard white cane's ground feedback.

Dom says: "Anyone who uses a cane already knows how handy they can be but imagine if your cane could also give you directions. find the nearest bus stop or alert you to obstacles that you're approaching. That's the idea behind the WeWalk Cane. I particularly like the fact that when the WeWalk navigates you, it gives you directions in the form of clock positions so, for example, instead of saying turn right, it says 'turn to 2 o'clock' to give you more precise and easier to follow commands.

"The WeWALK does use an integrated app on your smartphone but the cane itself actually has a built-in touchpad so you can leave your phone in your bag or pocket and control the WeWalk's features via the touchpad."
